

1 INTRODUCTION

Guru Nanak College, Dhanbad (A Skih Minority Degree College) was established by the Gurudwara Prabandhak Committee in 1970 to mark the Fifth Birth Centenary of the great Guru after whom this college is named. The college is managed by a Governing Council nominated by the Gurudwara Prabandhak Committee, Dhanbad, and draws its inspiration from the teachings of the faith propounded by Guru Nanak Devji. The college has got permanent affiliation with the B.B.M.K. University, Dhanbad in the faculties of Arts and Commerce upto Degree Level.

The College aims at catering to the academic needs of the students of Dhanbad, particularly those belonging to economically backward families of the surrounding area. Also, it aims at developing the personality of the individuals, and at grooming them into worthy citizens of tomorrow with an in-depth faith in oneness of God and Universal Brotherhood of man.

The College also aims at providing such training and tools to the students, by way of introducing vocational courses, as may help them win their bread easily.

The NAAC (National Assessment and Accreditation Council) reaccredited the College in its second cycle of assessment with grade "B" for five years, w.e.f. 5th October, 2021.

Guru Nanak College, Dhanbad functions at two places:

- 1. The Bhuda Campus of the college is situated at Bhuda, precisely 1 k.m. from Baramasia Railway Crossing on Dhanbad - Baliapur Road. The main building is spaciously designed in an airy surrounding quite suitable for the environment of an academic institution.
- 2. The Women's Wing of the college was started in the year 2000 in the Bank More Campus of the college in the morning hours. As an exclusive centre of teaching for girls, this Wing has earned a high reputation among girls and their parents/guardians during the last few years. In the Women's Wing also, teaching is imparted for Four Year Under-Graduate Programmes and Vocational Courses (BCA/BBA).
- A separate building for the Department of Vocational Studies is located adjacent to the Women's Wing Campus of the College. This facility caters to a large number of students enrolled in vocational courses such as BBA and BCA.

3 TEACHING STAFF

The College boasts a team of highly qualified and experienced faculty members who are deeply committed to the cause of education, character building, and service to society.

4 FOUR YEARS UNDERGRADUATE COURSES (FYUGP)

The College shall follow the syllabus and examination regulations as prescribed and updated by the affiliating University. The following is the course structure under the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP), which aligns with the revised UGC Guidelines and the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. This curriculum framework aims to promote holistic, multidisciplinary, and flexible undergraduate education in Jharkhand. The programme offers multiple entry and exit options within the four-year duration, with appropriate certifications at each stage.

The structure of certification under FYUGP is as follows:

- I. Certificate After successful completion of 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen field.
- ii. Diploma After completion of 2 years (4 semesters) of study.
- iii. Bachelor's Degree After completion of 3 years (6 semesters) of study.
- iv. Bachelor's Degree with Honours After completion of 4 years (8 semesters) of study.
- v. Bachelor's Degree with Honours/ Research/P.G. Diploma After completion of 4 years (8 semesters).

Academic Calendar and Examination Scheme

The Undergraduate Programme shall be spread over eight semesters across four academic years.

- Odd Semesters (I, III, V, VII): July to December
- Even Semesters (II, IV, VI, VIII): January to June

Each semester will include a Mid-Semester Examination conducted by the College. Students must qualify in this internal assessment in order to become eligible for filling up the University Examination Form. The End-Semester Examination will be conducted by the University at the conclusion of each semester.

5 PROFESSIONAL COURSES

The Department of Vocational Studies of Guru Nanak College offers two AICTE-approved professional courses—Bachelor of Computer Applications (BCA) and Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA)—at its Bank More Campus. Each course has an intake capacity of 90 students.

The campus features a modern academic building with all essential amenities. It houses three computer laboratories equipped with 30, 20, and 10 systems respectively, all with Internet access and modern facilities to support practical learning. Additionally, the classrooms for BCA and BBA are technologically equipped to facilitate effective teaching and learning.

To support academically weaker students, remedial classes are conducted on a regular basis. Efforts are consistently made to modernize the teaching methods, making them comparable to those offered at advanced centres.

Students enrolled in these courses also have access to the educational loan facility offered by various banks. Moreover, training and internship opportunities are provided during the course, and placement support is available upon successful completion of the programme.

Add-On Certification Initiatives: In addition to the main courses, the College also offers the following value-added certificate courses:

- "Spoken Tutorial" in collaboration with IIT Bombay (under MOOCS initiative)
- 2. Creativity a skill-based certificate programme

The College also runs four UGC-approved NSQF (National Skills Qualifications Framework) Certificate Courses and one NSQF Diploma Course to enhance the employability and skill set of students across disciplines.

- (ii) Certificate course in NGO Management,
- (iii) Certificate Course in Tourism Studies,
- (iv) Certificate Course in Functional English
- (v) Diploma Course in Functional English

6 EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Extra-curricular activities are a vital part of college education. This undoubtedly contributes to the development of a sound mind in a sound body. Qualities such as truthfulness, healthy competition, leadership and cooperation, in fact the whole personality is developed through games, sports, debate and other allied activities.

The college provides suitable opportunities to the students for participating in Cricket, Football, Volleyball, Badminton and Athletics tournaments organised by the university annually. Guru Nanak Cricket team has earned the distinction for winning the Vinoba Bhave University Inter College Tournament nine times out of fifteen, that too, five times in a row.

Binod Bihari Mahato Koylanchal University, Dhanbad has been carved out in 2018 from Vinoba Bhave University. The first Inter College Youth Festival and Inter College Cricket Tournament has been hosted and won by Guru Nanak College securing first position.

The college proposes to have multiple curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities around the academic year.

7 LIBRARY

The college has a well stocked library consisting of books on various subjects. Each student can borrow two books at a time for a period of fifteen days. It is important that students keep

returning the books in time, only then a library can be useful to a maximum number of students. Those who fail to return books within time will have to pay a fine, which will not be excusable by any authority.

The College also provides access to INFLIBNET. Information and Library Network (INFLIBNET) Centre is an autonomous Inter-University Centre of the University Grants Commission (UGC) of India. It is a major National Programme initiated by the UGC in March 1991 with its Head Quarters at Gujarat University Campus, Ahmedabad. Initially started as a project under the IUCAA, it became an independent Inter-University Centre in June 1996. INFLIBNET is involved in modernizing university libraries in India and connecting them as well as information centres in the country through a nation-wide high speed data network using the state-of-art technologies for the optimum utilisation of information. INFLIBNET is set out to be a major player in promoting scholarly communication among academicians and researchers in India.

A qualified librarian and an Assistant Librarian are available to guide the students with regard to the selection of books and other matters regarding the proper use of library facilities.

A librarian is over all in-charge of the library and is responsible for its maintenance and development.

8 COLLEGE MAGAZINE

In order to develop the creative and literary faculties of students, a college magazine titled Baisakhi is published annually. Short articles, reviews, poems, stories and critical essays contributed by the students and teachers are included in the issue. It has separate sections of three languages- English, Hindi and Punjabi.

9 NATIONAL CADET CORPS

There are two active units of N.C.C. (for boys and girls) in the College. Sri Sanjay Kr. Singh, PT.I. is in-charge of the College N.C.C. unit.

10 NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

The College has two units of NSS which runs under the guidance of (i) Prof. Daljeet Singh and (i) Prof. Anuradha Kumari, who are very active as N.S.S. Programme Officers.

11 DEPT. OF CREATIVITY

The college has been running the Department of Creativity with effect from the 2011-12 academic session. Distinguished teachers from outside the college are engaged in imparting teaching and training to the boys and girls having interest in cultural and literary activities, e.g. Dance, Drama, Music, Painting, Debate, Elocution and Quiz, etc. Dr. Ranjana Das is the coordinator of the Department.

12 NATURE CLUB

To create awareness among the students regarding the different environmental issues which are of huge concern to the survival of mankind, a Nature Club is formed in the Guru Nanak College Dhanbad in association with Indian Bird Photography Society (IBPS) for nature awareness programs.

13 READERS' CLUB

The Readers' Club of the college, aims to foster a culture of reading, intellectual growth, and community engagement among both students and teachers. Reading is not only a valuable educational tool but also a means to promote critical thinking, creativity, and a deeper understanding of various subjects. With such initiatives, we hope to provide a platform for individuals to come together, share their love for literature, and enrich their educational experience. Membership in the Reader's Club remains open to all students and teachers of Guru Nanak College. The Club arranges literary / reading programmes throughout the year.

14 COMMITTEES / CELLS

The following committees (cells) have been constituted by the college authorities to enforce discipline on the campus.

- 1. Women's Cell (Cell against sexual harassment)
- 2. Anti Ragging Cell and
- 3. Grievances Redressal Cell

The students can lodge their complaint in writing and put the same in the drop box available in the college library. Prompt action will be initiated by the college.

16 COLLEGE HOURS

Classes are held from 10.00 A.M. to 04.00 P.M. in the Bhuda Campus and from 8.00 A.M. to 2.00 P.M. in the Women's Wing of the college.

17 ADMISSION

Admission to the Under-Graduate and Vocational (BCA/BBA) courses is done through the Chancellor's Portal. Desirous students are required to apply through Chancellor Portal. Admission to various courses are offered by the college under National Education Policy 2020 (NEP-2020). The list of applicants admitted to the college is provided by the university which is arranged merit wise and published on the college website. The online admission is finally done through the college website. The system of admission is transparent.

The Principal may refuse admission to any candidate consideration unsuitable. Every candidate who is admitted will have to give an undertaking that he/she will abide by rules of the institution. Violation of college discipline and disregard of rules may lead to the removal of a student from the college. Students passing Intermediate Examination or its equivalent are admitted to Under-Graduate courses. Admission starts soon after the publication of examination results. The college will offer the syllabus along with the regulations of the B.B.M.K.U. Dhanbad.

The academic calendar and other details would be made

available to the students as and when received from the university on the college website / notice board and through the teachers.

Students attending less than (75%) seventy five percent classes will not be eligible to fill up the university examination forms.

Following documents are required to be submitted with the application form at the time of admission.

- 1. School or College Leaving Certificate on Original, showing the candidate's Date of Birth.
- 2. Photocopy of Marksheet in respect of marks obtained in the last examination.
- 3. Two Recent Passport size color photographs.
- 4. Attested photocopy of the Aadhar Card.
- 5. Migration certificate in original for students passing from any Board other than Jharkhand Academic Council.
- Certificate from appropriate authority in support of claim as scheduled caste/Scheduled Tribe/Annexure-Istudents. (These documents will be accepted only at the time of admission)

18 FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO THE MERITORIOUS AND NEEDY

A) FREESTUDENTSHIP

Such students who are good at studies and co curricular activities but come from economically poor homes will be eligible for grant of free studentship. Free studentship will be granted to a maximum of 12.5% of the total strength of a class, which is in accordance with the university and government rules.

Some free studentship (out of 12.5%) will be granted to meritorious students, outstanding sports persons and players and good debaters. A degree student who will be granted free studentship in Semester I will continue to avail this facility in Semester II, III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII too. If a student fails in an examination, this facility will automatically be withdrawn.
